

The Grand Masters from every jurisdiction, in the United States, Canada, Mexico and elsewhere around the world and their entourages, assemble once every year. This is an excellent opportunity for each of us to share ideas and discover what the other jurisdictions are doing.

We have now launched our new monthly "Podcast."

We will soon have our own YouTube TV channel.

We have redesigned our website to be more appealing to the 15,000 hits we receive each month.

We will very soon introduce a new and aggressive advertising campaign for TV and Radio.

We have promoted the idea that masonry continues into Scottish and York Rite masonry, as well Shrine masonry, by enabling each of these collateral groups to go directly into our lodges and recruit members.

We know that if we can provide exciting and interesting activities, then our membership will be more stimulated and many will choose to be more involved. Special degree conferrals and special events are a must for all of us. We cannot afford to allow our membership to become apathetic.





Maryland Council of Kadosh

WELL, we have survived one of the strangest periods of winter weather in recent history. December and most of January had temperatures that were well above normal - almost "balmy" at times; and then, the single largest snowfall ever recorded for Baltimore followed by single-digit highs with sub-zero wind chills. Then, in late February, we had the most rainfall on record for a single day. But, as is said in the lecture of the Fellowcraft Degree: "Freemasonry, notwithstanding, has still survived." Lodges have had their elections and installations of officers in the voluntary and peaceful transition of leadership and power that is a Masonic tradition which has spread beyond our gentle craft, and was an important landmark in the formation and establishment of the government of the United States. The Scottish Rite Bodies have held our meetings to

This has a great deal of significance and meaning for me, and I am grateful that I was allowed to use that bible on the altar for our installation.

Once again, it is an honor to be permitted to serve as Commander this year. Thank you for your support and all that you do in the cause of the Craft and our Rite.



The Phoenicians and a Passage to Ethiopia (cont'd)

Men of Tyre

The men of Tyre, servants of King Hiram, were descended from the ancient Phoenicians. As we read in 1 Kings, these men of Tyre were noted by their knowledge of the sea, a fact compounds the geographical problem of Joppa. The Phoenicians were the most skilled and respected seamen of the ancient Mediterranean, their trading routes spanned through the Iberian Peninsula and modern Morocco to the East coast of Africa to India. These seamen spanned the extent of the world with their trade, and were the first to circumnavigate Africa, begging the question of how could men of Tyre, with their seafaring tradition, head to Joppa to get to Ethiopia, particularly if some of the

The Biblical city of Joffa (Joppa), 30 miles away from Jerusalem was the major seaport for the city. Joppa was the landing point for the cedars provided by King Hiram for the temple, and it had a long Phoenician tradition. This was one of the cities founded by the Canaanites, from whom the Phoenicians were descended which was later absorbed by the Israelites. This city of Joppa makes even less sense as an embarkation point for Ethiopia when we consider that the city still had a large Phoenician population. They would have well known that it was not possible to able to sail to

MASTER CRAFTSMAN COURSE -"Scottish Rite Ritual & History" Essay for Quiz 5:

THE IDEA OF TRUTHS VERSUS HIGHER TRUTHS, and reality versus a higher realm of reality has always been a philosophy that I have personally found intriguing. Such ideas have been explored in various Eastern philosophies and Eastern religions, and have been the forefront of the New Age Mystical Enlightenment movement. It also bears worth noting that such ideas have also served as the original philosophy in the early days of Christianity.

The Thirty-First Degree (31°) -Inspector Inquisitor, presents us with an amazingly graphic, descriptive image of these enlightened philosophies, in which truths versus higher truths, and reality versus higher realities are described within the lessons of this Degree. What I found most pleasantly surprising, while studying for this particular quiz, is the way the tale of the deceased candidate (here in this Degree representing the Architect, Cheres), presents his soul, while standing trial before the various Egyptian Gods.

The image of a man's soul standing trial in the Court of the Dead, his casketed body close to where he stands, in a deep darkened cavern among the Egyptian Gods, conjures a very powerful image. The

lesson we are taught in this Degree, in describing the idea of truths versus higher truths, is expressed to help us face selfjudgment and introspection, so as to help us find the truth within ourselves. The way the 31st Degree presents this lesson, is one where a "mirror" is given to the candidate in which to peruse upon and view his true self, and take the time to really examine his nature, and come to the understanding that the ways of this hardened reality of the flesh, in which there exists pride and external fake virtues, in no way compares to the higher truths of divine moralities.

The lower truths, which represent the nature of man while he is alive, teaches us that those 'truths' are corrupted and sullied, and it's only through death and while standing judgment among the gods, are we able to peel away, remove, and divest of ourselves the last vestige of the corrupt hypocritical parts of us, until we are left with the higher untarnished truth, whereby we can truly ascend and walk among the Gods.

This introspection of ourselves, where layer by layer we remove of the corrupt and sullied parts of us, representing our reality in this life of flesh and blood, eventually leaves us with a clean, pure, spiritual being,

now able to walk among the ascended masters...amongst the Gods, in the 'Realm of Light' ("A Bridge To Light"...page 298).

In reading the material while studying for this Quiz, the 31st Degree does indeed peak my interest even more-so, with its dark and powerful imagery, yet at the same time providing us with an illuminating philosophy in which we are forced to look within, embrace the actual truths about ourselves, and then discard of the weaknesses of the mere mortal existence --- and ascend thereafter. The surprising thing is that the deep darkened cavern, in which we stand next to our casketed corpse, while standing introspective trial of ourselves, administered by what appears to be great intimidating Gods, eventually leads to a place of true light.

The poetic element of this Degree, from a darkened cavern, facing the scariest thing we can ever face...our true self...to a place of light, is surprisingly a very inspiring lesson, and one of hope. 'Hope' that we can face that which most of us dare not face in this life, discard of those weaknesses, and then walk as ascended beings.

A very powerful lesson indeed.

Kabbalah and the Scottish Rite

"The light that is revealed is called the Garment of the King. The light within, within is a concealed light.

In that light dwells the Ineffable One, the Unrevealed.


All those sparks and all those *lights sparkle from the Holy* Ancient One, concealed of all concealed, the High Spark.

Upon reflecting, all those lights emanating there is nothing but the High Spark, hidden and unrevealed"

For many people, the word Kabbalah conjures images of famous pop-stars like Britney Spears and Madonna wearing red strings as talismans to ward off dangers of the "evil eye." Or it might make some think of new age or occult practices. Scottish Rite Masons, however, are introduced to an entirely different concept of this ancient system of beliefs.

At the very beginning of our Scottish Rite journey, we were shown the Tree of Life of the Kabbalah, which is the tradition's central mystical symbol. It conceptually represents the divine emanations that created the world, including man. The Secret Master (4°) degree presents the Kabbalah simply as a philosophic system, not to be seen as a religious doctrine. It is a symbolic and mystical school of thought that will aid us in our masonic progression through the degrees of the Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite.

The Kabbalah is referenced in just under a quarter of the current degrees of the A&ASR. Although the degrees of the Scottish Rite regularly mention the Kabbalah, like many other themes in our degrees, it is entrusted to each of us to interpret its meaning and discover how it could be important in our lives. Both the Scottish Rite and the Kabbalah are rich with multiple layers of symbolism and allegory. Kabbalah (הּלָבַק) literally means "receiving" and alludes to the receiving of the ancient esoteric wisdom passed down over the centuries from mouth to ear.




17th Century detailed depiction of the Tree of Life by Athanasius Kircher

Traditional Kabbalists believe the Kabbalah pre-dates world religions but it developed within Judaism. It is so interwoven with Jewish tradition that it is difficult to separate Kabbalah from the religion, although some Christians and occult groups have tried to adapt it to align with their belief systems. Even thoughh it was originally an oral tradition, it was eventually

written down in multiple texts, comprising the body of work of the Kabbalah. Some of the primary texts are the Hekhalot, Sefer Yetzirah, Bahir, and the most well-known, the Zohar. Isaac Luria expanded on the teachings of the Zohar in the 16th century. One of the central concepts in Lurianic Kabbalah is the existence of a divine spark in man, something that should remind every Scottish Rite Mason of the Holy Doctrine of the 32°.

Before these primary texts appeared, many mystical themes in the Kabbalah tradition existed in Talmudic sources. One such theme was the Ma'aseh Merkavah (הבכרמ השעמ), meaning "work of the chariot." This deals with the vision Ezekiel received on the banks of the Chabar River where he visualized the four ethereal universes of Kabbalah, corresponding to the four letters of the Tetragrammaton. In his vision, Ezekiel saw four Chayot (Living Creatures), each with four faces: a man, a lion, an ox, and an eagle.

Ancient Metallurgy and Masonic Symbolism

PART I

Throughout my career, I have pursued my livelihood in the field of manufacturing, and that choice was due, in part, to my interest in the industrial arts. While much of Masonic symbolism is linked to the tools of the builder's trade, we are also given a taste of other manufacturing arts, particularly metallurgy and foundry operations. This paper explores the technology and symbolism related to the casting of metal during the period when King Solomon built his temple.

The first order of business is to clarify our use of the words "brass" and "brazen." This metal was not used by ancient people because brass is artificially created by mixing copper with zinc. The element zinc was not discovered until the 16th Century, and although its use in copper alloys predates its discovery, there is no archeological or historical record of its use until the Christian era. In Freemasonry, what we refer to as being made of brass, was, in fact, bronze, another artificially produced substance made by mixing copper and tin. When producing the King James Bible, first published in 1612, early translators mistakenly used "brass" when "bronze" was correct. Another example of translator inaccuracy is using the word "brass" instead of "copper". There is a certain text in the scriptures that erroneously refers to mining brass, which does not occur geologically.

Bronze is a very significant material in the history of humanity. It was stronger than wrought iron and used for a myriad of applications. Tools, armor, decorative items and weapons were produced from bronze. The earliest forms of bronze were alloys of copper and arsenic. Later, the superior blend of copper and tin was discovered and utilized. Copper and tin rarely occur together in deposits of ore, therefore, the production of bronze required commerce and trade.

The general proportion of the components of bronze is approximately 85-90% copper, and the remainder is tin. By varying the amounts of each metal in the mixture, the properties of the bronze can be adjusted to achieve desirable results. There are many bronze tools in the British Museum collection found by Austin Layard at Nineveh. When an analysis was performed, it was learned that the tools such as chisels were approximately 88% copper, a scabbard 85%, a musical instrument 88% and a mirror was 67% Copper, 25% tin, and 8% lead. Other analyzes reveal additional trace elements in the bronze such as iron. Ancient craftsman seemed to possess lost knowledge in hardening the sharpened end of a chisel and coating the bronze with a corrosion inhibiting patina.

The discovery of releasing metals from their ores by fire and innovations in the art of casting and forging can be biblically traced to the work of Tubal, who was a descendant of Cain. Contrary to the popular belief of those who get their biblical history and theology from Hollywood, Tubal-Cain was not the nemesis of Noah. By the description in the book of Genesis, he was a metalsmith. Some scholars believe he was a miner. The deeper meaning of his place in Masonic symbolism has been suggested by Albert Mackey, who tells us that he is a symbol of worldly possessions. Perhaps he serves as a reminder to all good Masons, that the path to being perfected is not through acquisition of the trappings of success, but rather intangibles such as the attainment of useful knowledge.

Classrooms, a library, lounges, a robing room and a property room have all been provided for. Headquarters for the Sovereign Grand Inspector General and the Secretary of the Orient of Maryland are among the many other features located in the splendid edifice. The temple was designed by brothers Clyde and Nelson Friz of Baltimore in association with Mr. John Russell Pope of New York City.

Ok, back to today, the 21st century and your home, a home that you have a right to be proud of. Any Brother in the Orient of Maryland can invite anyone to visit, without shame, to see the majestic beauty of his Scottish Rite Temple. This majestic beauty is symbolic of the beauty and dignity of a creed whose ultimate ideal is the Universal Brotherhood of Man and recognition of the Fatherhood of God! Respect for One's Self and Respect for the Organization is Self-Evident in the maintenance and preservation of this magnificent home of Scottish Rite Masonry in Maryland.

Many of you talked about a much needed campaign to raise funds. I talked about the majestic steps leading up to the entrance. These steps and the wall they abut are in serious need of repair. The elements have not been kind to the 80 year old limestone. The cost to just repair the steps and wall is in excess of \$300,000. We have completed the repairs to the roof and now the galvanized steel drain pipes, that carry water off the roof, have started to rust away and new leaks in the auditorium dome can be seen. These repairs are estimated to be near \$100,000 or more. It seems we repair one thing and a new need arises. This is to be expected with anything that ages. Look at some of us as we grow older (or mature). It costs money for our maintenance.

In the beginning, I mentioned that many of you suggested we start a campaign to raise funds for an endowment to preserve and maintain our temple that will eventually become self-sustaining. Raising money through outright gifts is much the same way in which the Maryland Brethren of the Scottish Rite built this temple. Today, hallowed by the same Brotherly love of all Scottish Rite Masons in the Orient of Maryland who recognize the sacredness of their Masonic ties,

the Scottish Rite Temple will be preserved as a monument to the Masonic ideals for our children and our children's children. We all talk about how much we receive from Masonry; it is not, therefore, too much to ask that now we give something back to Scottish Rite Masonry.

Remember the brother who said "I have paid my dues for over 30 years"? INSTEAD, why not make a pledge to our temple preservation fund and pay it off in 30 months? (30 monthly payments)
