

## Charities that MASONS become involved in

US THAT ONE CHARITY OR ANOTHER IS ALWAYS ASKING FOR OUR HELP. What seems more interesting to me is how these various charities that Masons become involved in may affect our lives and affect each other. I will not try to trace

each other. I will not try to trace all of the various charitable endeavors that have a Masonic involvement. I would, however, like to talk about a few of the intertwining issues that we may see as we look back over the recent past.

Way back in the 1960's, Royal Arch Research Assistance chose as their research project "Research into speech problems" at the University of Colorado. It is most interesting that some of that basic research is now part of our Scottish Rite Speech and Language Center.

For over fifty years, research grants have been given annually to Wilmer Eye Institute at Johns Hopkins. In my own case, I have benefitted from

some of those research grants by receiving a partial cornea transplant three weeks ago. This particular technique has only been available for the past two years and is a direct result of continuing research by the Knight Templar Eye Foundation. What a blessing to watch as sight is restored in my left eye. I had no idea that I was part of my own future when I was privileged to make some of these presentations fifteen years ago.

As Regional Deputy Grand
Master for General Grand
Council, I was able to visit the
University of Indiana School of
Medicine and learn about some
of the advances that they were
making in surgery to replace
heart valves and expedite bypass vessels. Many Masons,
including myself, have benefited
from this vast research, not only
at Indiana U, but everywhere.

We are all aware of Jerry's kids and the amount of research that our Tall Cedars Foundation has been able to contribute to Muscular Dystrophy and other muscular conditions. We cannot forget our Shrine Hospitals for Crippled Children and Burns Units. This is probably the most publicized program of all the Masonic programs.

Our own Grand Lodge has been a leader in Drug and Alcohol Abuse Counseling in the Maryland school systems. Not to mention the scholarships that Maryland Masonic charities issue every year.

These and many more programs are sponsored by various Masonic organizations. We urge you to continue to support and promote those of your choosing.

We, however, would encourage you to think about our own Scottish Rite Speech and Language Center. Keep in mind that those young people that we help today may have a significant impact on the future of our state and nation. We never know what a few dollars in research or teaching to a young person may affect ten, twenty, or even fifty years from now. If I have indirectly benefitted from contributions made many years ago, how much more can our future generations benefit from the small donations that we are making today? At the end of this publication is a list of recent Charitable Contributions. I hope that many of us want to see our names there, not for our benefit, but for the future.

## The Higher Degrees of Masonry

# BRETHREN, WELCOME TO THE FOURTH DEGREE, ONWARD TO THE ESOTERIC!

It doesn't take long to use the Esoteric as a teaching aid, as we are first introduced to aspects of the Kabbalah in the fourth degree. Brethren, the Kabbalah is more than the hot thing in Hollywood for Madonna and company to study between Yoga and the latest in organic cooking. The Kabbalah is an ancient Jewish mystical philosophy, or theosophy, which seeks to describe the nature of man, Deity, and the interrelationship between the two. It is an apt teaching aid in our efforts to seek further light in Masonry.

The Kabbalah accomplishes its teaching through symbol and allegory, which to the Freemason, is a language that is both accessible and familiar, as these are the very tools the Blue Lodge uses to teach its lessons.


The word "Kabbalah" is derived from the Hebrew word "kabal," which means to receive, as it is the tradition for the doctrine or theosophy to be received from the elders. I have not been a Mason, or in the Rite, particularly long...but to those of us in the jurisdiction of Maryland, there is something familiar about the idea of tradition and knowledge that is received from our elders. In reading about the history of the Kabbalah, I was taken back to catechism class and being instructed by Brothers who were the age of my grandfather... to the kind words of a Past Master patiently correcting a "that" or a "there" during floor work. There is something particularly Masonic in the tradition of passing knowledge between generations.

In the Jewish tradition, the study of the Kabbalah was limited to those who had put in years of study, becoming experts in Torah and Talmud, since the philosophy sought to explain profound truths through symbols and allegories. The lessons were to explain the divine to the finite, so the student needed to have a firm understanding of historical and theological Jewish tradition, so as not to misinterpret the Supreme Architect. The Scottish Rite takes the Kabbalah not as a theological system but as a symbolic system used to illustrate moral concepts and philosophical meaning.

The Kabbalists used these lessons to illustrate that the Creator of the Universe was so complex and incomprehensible that a system was required to allow the human mind to understand the nature of creation. In our fourth degree, we use it as a teaching aid for the same purpose; our Fourth Degree highlights the "Tree of Life" as corresponding to the three principle officers of our Blue Lodges and the pillars Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty which support them. The "Tree of Life" in the Kabbalah has three pillars, which correspond with our three Masonic pillars and consist of nine attributes of Deity that typify Masonic virtues. So the Kabbalah, to the Scottish Rite Mason, is a road map to understand that these nine virtues are not only the virtues of the individual Mason, but also of the Creator.

"To Know, to Will, to Dare, and to be Silent...Acknowledging our duties, let us practice them..." remembering that the Kabbalah can assist us in our efforts along the way. My Brethren, visit your Blue Lodge, and stop by to see the degree work at the Rite!

## UNCOVER THE MEANING OF MASONRY



#### ARE YOU A NEW MASTER MASON

or perhaps been a member for some time and just have not had a chance to be active or get involved? Are you recently retired and looking for something in which to participate?

Why not continue your Masonic Journey? Most men today have a desire to uncover the meaning of Masonry. They want to know how to interpret the symbols and lessons they encountered as they passed from degree to degree. As you have been introduced to the principles of Masonry, we congratulate you and invite you to continue your journey.

Have you given any real thought to it or wondered what it was all about? What is the grasshopper story (Ecl 12:1-7) about? What did they mean by operative and speculative? Who were St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist?

The Scottish Rite is often referred to as the "University of Freemasonry," and offers 29 degrees and several programs that can help answer these and many other questions. Have you given any thought to those other 29 degrees? There are some very interesting storylines and some very intriguing lessons and meanings. The "University" has an educational program that provides an indepth study of the degrees. Master Craftsman I and II are designed as

self-study programs, or you can join a group study. You are always welcome to sit in as a monitor or visitor. Knowledge is power and it has been said, "If you think education is expensive, think what ignorance can cost."

There are many collateral bodies available and each has its purpose, philanthropy and Masonic roots, but you must take the first step to get involved.

The Tall Cedars is an appending Masonic body devoted to fostering friendship and fellowship among Freemasons and all mankind.

Their primary charity is Muscular Dystrophy.

The Grotto of North America is a charitable organization dedicated to promoting good fellowship and fun among Master Masons. They make no claim to being a Masonic order nor do they confer Masonic degrees. Yet the membership is exclusively Masonic and Masonic in character. Their charity is providing dental care to children with special needs.

The Eastern Star is a social Order comprised of both men

and women whose purpose is to promote charitable, educational, fraternal and scientific values. Their charitable works support national, jurisdictional and local charities.

The Shrine of North America is built upon the principles of Freemasonry while adding fun and philanthropy. One Potentate describes the Shrine as "The Playground of Masonry." Their major philanthropy are the Shriners Hospitals for Children.

The York Rite has three separate and autonomous bodies: Chapter, Council and Commandery. They each conduct meetings and present degrees or ritual. All three promote behaviors and lessons that strengthen and civilize man.

The York Rite and Scottish Rite are so similar and yet so different that pages could be written about each. For the sake of time and space, it could be said that the Scottish Rite is the champion of individual freedoms and citizenship, while the York Rite is the champion of self-reflection and self-improvement through religion.

The York Rite Charities vary by body. The Royal Arch Chapter supports auditory research for children, the Council of Royal and Select Masters supports the Cryptic Mason Medical Research Foundation, and the Knights Templar Commanderies support the Children's Eye Foundation.

As you can see, there are many paths leading to further light and all are open to anyone willing to take the first step and continue their journey. The journey will be both fun and enlightening.

So if you have an interest in any of the collateral bodies or in learning more about our gentle Fraternity, why not take the first step, get involved, and complete the journey.

## A Brief History of Coats Masonic Temple

ON THE 26TH OF DECEMBER IN THE YEAR 1880, Coats Lodge No. 102 held its first meeting at its Temple Building on 114 N. Washington Street in the town of Easton, Maryland. Originally numbered Coats Lodge No. 76, Coats Lodge No. 102 was officially chartered on November 21, 1855.

The lodge is named after Dr. John Coats, a prominent Revolutionary and Freemason who served in Washington's Army. The building is composed of three floors and a basement. The initial size of the building was 1600 sq. ft. In 1930, an addition to the temple was built, which now serves as the lodge room where several Masonic bodies meet, including Talbot Chapter No. 22 Royal Arch Masons and Jeshua Council No. 8 Royal and Select Masters. The old section of the building is now used as a dining hall and for less formal meetings.

In 1980, on the 125th anniversary of Coats Lodge, Mayor George P. Murphy gave the lodge special recognition for its many years of service to

the community. In honor of the memory of Dr. John Coats and the members of Coats Lodge, he proclaimed November 17-23 as Masonic Week. Twenty-five years later, on October 28, 2005, in commemoration of its 150th anniversary, Coats Lodge was again recognized by the town of Easton for continued service to the community. Mayor Robert C. Willey made a proclamation dedicating November 15, 2005 as Coats Lodge No. 102 Ancient Free and Accepted Masons Day.

Throughout the years, many have passed through the doors of Coats Masonic Temple seeking to become part of the world's oldest and largest fraternity. Men from all walks of life and professions have asked the question, "Is there greatness in me?" It is through renewed membership and brotherly love that Freemasonry continues to flourish. May 5, 2012 is a day that all Masonic Lodges in Maryland will open their doors to extend a fraternal hand and welcome potential candidates inside to look around and get a glimpse of what Freemasonry is all about.

## A Word from Dr. Albert G. Mackey, 33°

THERE ARE THOUSANDS OF MASONS who can repeat the ritual, but who have no conception of what it all means. There is nothing said in the ritual that should seem mysterious. Everything in Masonry has a beautiful meaning if rightly understood, and everything done in the ritual work is meant to teach a distinct moral lesson. Masonry would die out in a few years if it had to depend upon about 85% of the membership. It is the small minority—the really interested Masons-who have kept and are keeping the order alive today. These few men give unselfishly their time and intelligence as officers of their Lodges. How long would any Lodge last if all the members merely paid their dues, rarely if ever attended Lodge, and considered their duty done? Does Masonry mean anything to you, or are you just "a member"? Some Masons seem to take pride in saying, "Oh yes, I belong to the order, but have not been in a Lodge room in years." Of what benefit is Masonry to this man, and what earthly benefit is he to Masonry? Then again, you will hear a Mason say, "I have lost my interest in Masonry." He never had any real interest to lose. All he has lost is his curiosity. If he had been interested, he would have learned something about it, and his interest would have been increased instead of dying out.

The Mason who pays his dues

because he is ashamed not to, is simply throwing his money away. He gets no benefit whatsoever, and his attitude of indifference sets a bad example to the younger Masons, who look to him for inspiration and guidance.

Taking the secret work and learning the ritual does not make a Mason any more than learning his A B C's makes a child a scholar. It is merely the cornerstone; the building is yet to be erected.

How many Masons understand the beautiful lesson of the third degree? If this lesson were learned and understood and practiced, Masonry would be on a higher plane than it is today. There would be more real Masons and fewer "members." Too many Masons say, "I have no time," but they had or took the time to take their degrees and learn the catechism. The same amount of time spent in intelligent study would give them the groundwork for a real knowledge of Masonry. If Masonry is worth going into, it is worth knowing something about.

## **Degrees to be Conferred** in Baltimore

Spring Class of 2012

## Wednesday, March 7th



4° – **Secret Master** – Duty, reflection and study are the gateway to opportunity. As such, one honors those relationships to God, family, country and Masonry. The apron of the 4th Degree is white and black, with a letter "Z" and all-seeing eye. The jewel of this degree is an ivory key with the letter "Z" on the wards. The duties are secrecy, obedience and fidelity.

5° – **Perfect Master** – The degree teaches Masonic honor; that honesty and trustworthiness is the cornerstone of the foundation of such. This virtue should be in all of our undertakings with mankind. The apron of the 5th Degree is white and green, with a cubic stone and a Hebrew YOD. The jewel is represented by a compass open on a segment of a circle, to an angle of sixty degrees. The duties are honesty, sincerity, good faith and industry.



## Wednesday, March 14th



11° – **Elu of the Twelve** (Sublime Knight Elect of the Twelve) – This degree teaches sympathy. We should be compassionate to our brother Masons and to all mankind as well. The apron of the 11th Degree is white, lined with black, with a flaming heart in the center. The jewel is a dagger suspended from a black cordon inscribed with the words "Vincere aut Mori," the

pledge "that you will rather die than betray the cause of the people, or be overcome through your own fear or fault." The duties are to be earnest, true, reliable and a champion of the people.



13° – **Royal Arch of Solomon** (Knight of the Ninth Arch) – Liberty in our mind and hearts and motivated by duty and honor are the lessons of this degree. The apron of the 13th Degree is purple, bordered with white and with the "Enochian delta" (hexagram inscribed with Tetragrammaton) in the center. The jewel comprises a circular

medal of gold. The duties are to seek knowledge and to be motivated by duty and honor.

## Wednesday, March 21st

# VIRTUS JUNXIT MORS NON SEPARABIT

"Whom virtue unites, death shall not separate"

14° – **Perfect Elu** (Grand Elect, Perfect and Sublime Mason) – This degree teaches us to reflect and scrutinize ourselves. We should strive to be true to ourselves and our God. The apron being of white silk, bordered in gold with the



Ineffable Delta in the center, is truly emblematical of the degree. The jewel of the 14th Degree is split; one being a quadrant (compass open to ninety degrees) topped by a crown and with a nine-pointed star on the obverse; the other being a five-pointed blazing star with the Tetragrammaton on the reverse. The compass is opened on a segment of a circle inscribed with the numbers 3, 5, 7, 9. The duties are to assist, encourage and defend the brethren; to protect the oppressed and relieve want and distress; to enlighten the people and serve the common good.



Wednesday, March 28th

18° – **Knight Rose Croix** – This degree emphasizes that life and its strength come from God. The rose signifies the dawn, and the cross is a sacred symbol of antiquity in many cultures. One is also taught to be tolerant of other's errors and faults. The apron is of white leather

or satin, bordered in red, with a skull and cross-bones, a red passion cross and three red rosettes. The grand jewel is a gold compass open a quarter circle. A rose-cross is between the legs of the compass and under it is a pelican, tearing its breast to feed its seven young on the obverse, and an eagle with wings extended on the reverse. On the circle are the letters I.N.R.I. The duties are to practice virtue; to labor to eliminate vice; to purify humanity; to be tolerant of the faith and creed of others.



20° – **Master of the Symbolic Lodge** – This degree demonstrates liberty, fraternity and equality. These truths teach morals, religious and philosophical understandings. This degree helps one to comprehend Deity, the forces of nature and good and evil. The apron is yellow bordered in blue, with three concentric point-down triangles, with the Tetragrammaton

(horizontal) and Fiat Lux (vertical) at the center forming a cross. Its triangular shape relates to the "fourth great light, which reminds us of the Deity and his attributes." The jewel is made of gold with the same three concentric triangles. The duties are to dispense light and knowledge and to practice Masonic virtues.

## Reunion Day – Saturday, March 31st

## 21° – Noachite, or Prussian

**Knight** – The lessons to be learned from this degree are that arrogance, defamation and cowardice are unworthy attributes of a Mason; and that humility, modesty and courtesy are the true virtues of men and Masons. The apron is yellow and contains an arm holding a sword, a winged figure holding a key in the left



hand and the right forefinger on the lips (the Egyptian figure of silence). The jewel can be described as a point-up triangle, with an arrow, point downward, an arm holding a sword and the motto "Fiat Justitia, Ruat Coelum." The duties are humility, modesty, trust in God and to be steadfast and courageous in the face of adversity.



30° – **Knight of Kadosh, or Knight of the White & Black Eagle** – The lesson of this degree is to be true to ourselves, to stand for what is right and to be just in our lives today with a belief in God, country and oneself. There is no apron, but the jewel is a gold Teutonic cross, enameled in red, with a silver doubleheaded eagle with wings spread

pointing downward resting upon it. The duty is to labor unceasingly for the good of mankind.

32° – **Master of the Royal Secret** – The lessons taught in this degree are that genuine brotherhood requires mutual regard, opinion, esteem and charity. We always look for the good in all and make allowances for other's shortcomings. We trust the Supreme Architect to lead us to friendship, morality and brotherly

love. The apron of this degree is



white, lined in black, with a double-headed eagle and a plan of the Camp of the Princes. The jewel worn is a golden Teutonic cross. In the center are the letters XXXII, surrounded by a green wreath. The cap of a Master of the Royal Secret is black silk with a black band trimmed in gold. In the center front is a doubleheaded eagle emblem with a rayed equilateral triangle above in gold. The triangle is red, has 32° in its center and is trimmed with gold. The duties are: a Soldier of the Light seeks truth and knowledge; a Soldier of Freedom demands for the people free vote and voice and attains freedom of voice, vote and opinion for himself; a Soldier of the True Religion combats spiritual tyranny with reason and truth; a Soldier of the People encourages men to be self-reliant and independent; a Soldier of Scottish Rite Masonry is zealous and ardent in the performance of his duties to God, his country, his family, his brethren and himself.


# AFTER MORE THAN 80 YEARS,

our Temple is in need of significant exterior renovation. Over the past year, the Scottish Rite Holding Company Board (which oversees the building) has identified and listed in order of priority the tasks that must be undertaken. As you can see from the photos, these range from mortar repainting of the exterior limestone blocks, to step repair/alignment, to roof replacement and repair. This is all to stop the water intrusion that has been taking place over the last 30 years.

As you may have noticed as you walk through the building, we have been making interior repairs over the last two years, including but not limited to: replacement of broken steam pipes in the Ladies' and Men's Lounges, repair and replastering of the cracks on the interior of the dome, replastering and repainting the classroom and Whitehurst Lounge, and replacing sinks and ruptured waterlines in the men's washroom.

The Board has set up a separate Fund, called the Scottish Rite Temple Restoration Fund. All donations made to this Fund are tax deductable as a 501(c) organization. As work progresses, photos and descriptions of the completed work will become a regular feature of this magazine.



# MAUNDY THURSDAY DINNER — Why We Meet This Day Thursday, April 5th, 2012

The most logical reason is to rededicate ourselves, but to be more explicit, this meeting on Maundy Thursday for the Hebrew is in commemoration of Passover, a great religious feast celebrated by the Jews on the thirteenth day of their calendar month Nisan, for their release from slavery in Egypt. For the Christian, the meeting on Maundy Thursday is in remembrance of the last supper of our Lord, which was on Holy Thursday nearly 2,000 years ago.

From these meetings on Maundy Thursday, let the vivid impressions bring humility and good deeds to the exhibit of Masonry, rededicating ourselves to the labors of Masonry. This task is not easy, but it has meaning and influences young people, the leaders of tomorrow. This task can be pleasant and enjoyable, for his life is as broad as its love and service, as high as its ideals and as deep as its convictions.

## The Symbols of the Mystic Banquet

- 1. **The Matzo**, or unleavened bread, is also called bread of affliction. It is symbolic of the bread which the Hebrews made when they hastily left Egypt, because they did not have enough time to allow their dough to rise. The Matzo is the most important symbol of Passover.
- 2. **The Moror**, or bitter herb (represented by a small slice of horseradish), is symbolic of the hardships which the Israelites endured while they were slaves in Egypt.
- 3. **The Haroses**, a paste of apples, nuts, spices and wine, is symbolic of the mortar the Israelites used when they were slaves, in the construction of the Pharaoh's treasure cities, Pithom and Ramses.
- 4. **The Shank Bone**, a roasted bone, is symbolic of the Paschal Lamb that was sacrificed and eaten on the eve of Passover.
- 5. **The Hard-Boiled Egg** is symbolic of life and spring time, when nature renews life.
- 6. **The Four Cups of Wine** commemorate the four promises made by God to Moses to redeem the Israelites and bring them out of bondage.








## The Clinic Corner

HAPPY NEW YEAR! It's hard to believe that the holidays are behind us and a new year has begun. It has been a great year for the Scottish Rite Speech and Language Clinic. We would like to thank the Masons, the Scottish Rite Woman's Club, and the Hearing and Speech Agency, as well as our client families, for their continued support and dedication to our clinic. We were able to raise extra money for the clinic and purchase much-needed technology. Special thanks go to Marlin Mills, Sovereign Grand Inspector General in Maryland, for allowing the clinic to purchase the iPad 2 for our clinicians. We are now the only clinic in the immediate area using this new technology in our treatment.

With the launch of the iPad 2, the clinic has been able to implement the most up-to-date speech and language therapy sessions and evaluations. This device, similar to a small computer, is being used with children with a variety of speech and language difficulties, including apraxia, articulation disorders, receptive and expressive language disorders, fluency disorders, and voice disorders. The iPad 2 applications (software programs) use animation to help children practice their oral motor skills, track changes in speech fluency, as well as improve their vocabulary skills. One of the biggest populations that has benefited from the iPad 2 is our children with autism. The Proloquo2Go application that we purchased for the iPad 2 allows children that have difficulty communicating due to autism or any other communication disorder to communicate their basic needs and interests through the use of images and corresponding audio. Please check out the use of the iPad 2 with children with autism on the CBS



television show "60 Minutes." Go to cbsnews.com and click on the 60 Minutes tab. Next, click on the Science tab and click on the "Apps for Autism" segment aired on October 23, 2011. This will show you how important this technology can be for children who cannot communicate with their own voice.

We would like to welcome our new student intern, Nikki Gorsuch, to our clinic. She is a communication sciences graduate student at Towson University and will be helping us diagnose and treat our children with speech and language disorders. We are very lucky to have her as part of our Scottish Rite Clinic team!
