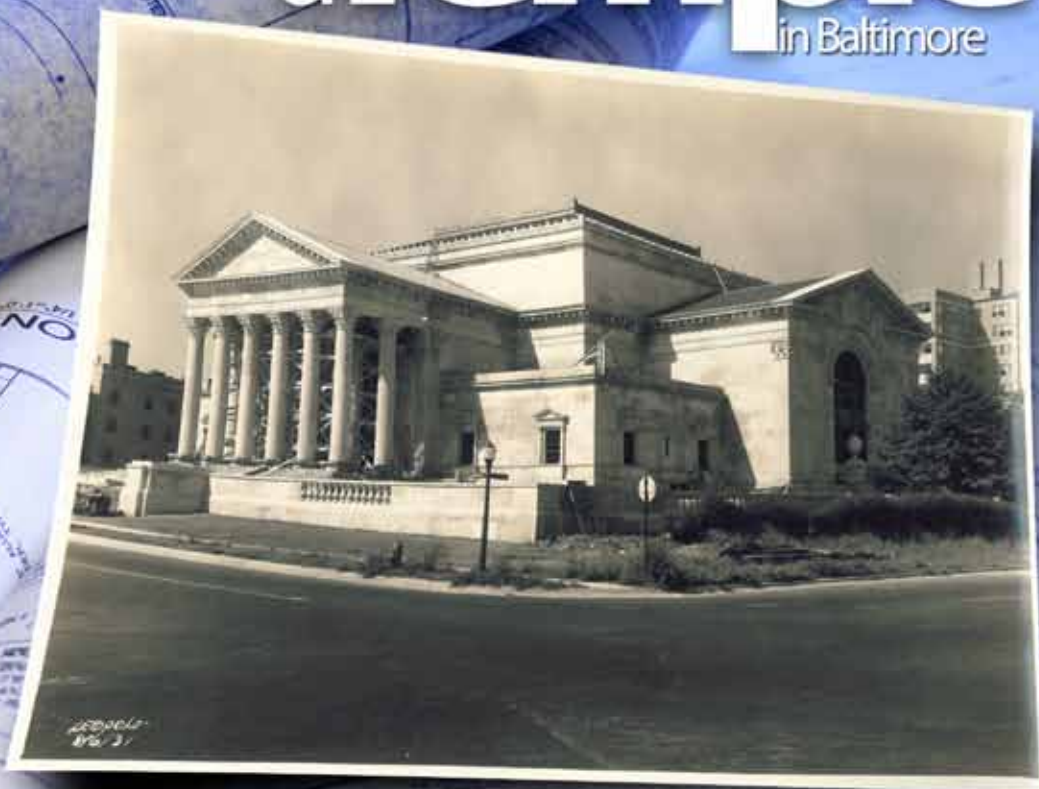

THE OLDEST MARINE

My very good friend Richard Rhinehart was 102 years old on March 10th 2010. Richard is the oldest living United States Marine. On March 2nd, the celebration started with a luncheon with about 35 of his friends at Friendly Farms in Upperco, Maryland. Richard likes to go there several times a year for lunch, so it was wonderful that we could join him on this particular Tuesday afternoon. We sang happy birthday, sang the Marine Corps Hymn and listened to several stories.


Several months ago, when the Marine Corps realized that their oldest member lived so near, The Commandant of The Marine Corps invited him to be his guest at TATTO Service in Washington. He sat with The Commandant and watched the "Pirade" and listened to the Marine Band and was quite impressed. He still talks about this treatment every time someone will listen.

Richard enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1928. He was one of the first Marines in the Marine Air Corps. He was a tail gunner during the Nicaraguan Campaign and actually shot something from his plane. He completed his ten years prior to World War II.

On his actual birthday, March 10th, he was invited to the "House of the Temple" (The headquarters for the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States, at 16th Street in Washington, DC). An interview was set up with ABC News to talk about being

the oldest Marine and Oldest Scottish Rite Mason in the Southern Jurisdiction. I do not know when this will actually air. I will try and keep anyone interested informed. Our Deputy for Maryland, Marlin Mills was with him all day and said they really put on a show for him.

He attended our regular Rite Cheer Luncheon at the Scottish Rite on Thursday the 11th. Of course we sang Happy Birthday again and he told us of all the exciting things that had happened. Richard is in excellent physical condition. He works out at the gym twice a week and walks at least a mile three times a week. If you shake hands with him, be careful, he has a very strong handshake.

It was my pleasure several years ago to present him with a 60 or 70 year service award. He is quite a guy. He still RUNS the parking lot for special guests at the Scottish Rite Temple in Baltimore. Do not try to park in any of his special places. He is great.

One such program is the National Sojourners Award. This award is presented each year to an outstanding ROTC cadet who has demonstrated a true example of Americanism on his or her campus. CUMBERLAND CONSISTORY
BUCK-A-CUP FUND RAISER

The Cumberland Consistory, Valley of Cumberland partnered with the League for Crippled Children to establish the Scottish Rite Language Disorder and Speech clinic in 1997. The clinic was established to be the principle philanthropy of Cumberland Scottish Rite. In addition the Cumberland Clinic has an orofacial clinic for children with cleft lip and/or cleft palate. The clinic is available to all young clients in need of these special services. All Scottish Rite members are active entity of the foundation, through which funds come to support the speech clinic.

We generate additional funds by two community fund raisers supported by the local commu-

nities in Allegany, Garrett, and Washington counties in Maryland and Mineral County in West Virginia. The Buck-A-Cup fund raiser is managed by the retirement club of the Scottish Rite. Two days in December is designated fro the button holder to receive free coffee and tea at a sponsoring establishment. The second fund raiser is the THING-A-MA-JIG, "Showcase of Talent", to be held this year at Allegany College of Maryland in Cumberland, on April 16th at 7:30pm in the auditorium. The cost is \$10.00 perperson. This will be our eighth year of producing outstanding musical programs for the citizens of our local and surrounding communities. Proceeds from the event support the organization's Childhood Language Disorder Clinic.
