Grand Master's Message

MY BROTHERS, As I compose this message, we are about to experience our second annual statewide "Open House." We are greatly encouraged by the results of our 2011 efforts. In 2011, we raised 863 men. That is nearly double our average year's figure. Additionally, many of our collateral bodies are experiencing similar increases. Two dormant DeMolay Chapters have

been revived and one additional new chapter has been formed. The Open House in 2011 generated this interest. One of our Eastern Star Chapters received ten new petitions which is unheard of regarding recent events. The female youth groups, the York and Scottish Rite are beginning to see new interest and new members. There is one sure way to insure that the Scottish Rite and every collateral body can benefit from increased membership in our Blue Lodges and that is to be a serving and working presence in each individual Scottish Rite Brothers' symbolic lodge.

To pursue "further light" in masonry by joining "The Rite" must be seen by the lodges not as a drain on their resources, but rather the fact that active Scottish Rite Masons are active Blue Lodge Masons who are always conscious of their duty to their mother lodge.

We look forward to reporting to all brothers regarding our 2012 membership efforts. Often we hear brothers expressing concerns that we need not pursue new members with vigor, that we need to guard the "West Gate," and that we want quality and not quantity. My response is that we do, and will continue to guard the "West Gate." I remind our brothers that in 1961, our membership in the Grand Lodge of Maryland was 49,000 and today it is 16,200. Thus, of eligible Maryland men in 1961, one in 15 were Freemasons; in 2011, one man in 105 is a Freemason. Assuming that there was quality in our 1961 membership, and that in 2011 there are many men of quality available to us from the men of Maryland, there is much quality available to us as our quantity increases. It is not a "fire sale" on membership going on, but an exercise in survival. Our Grand Lodge of Maryland is growing. Together, we will insure that Freemasonry is a force for good forever.

Memorial Day

WHEN I WAS GROWING UP,

MEMORIAL DAY was always celebrated on May 30th. On that day as a Boy Scout, we decorated the graves of veterans in the several cemeteries of the small town where I lived with American Flags. There was always a parade in the afternoon and everyone was present. It was an important community event. However, the Memorial Day that I remember most was in 1944. I was serving on the USS Block Island, CVE 21 in the Atlantic. The "Block" was an Escort Aircraft Carrier and we were proud to have aboard for that cruise, Squadron VC 55, a composite squadron for anti-submarine patrol. Early on the 29th it was announced that we would suspend Air Operations for a few hours on the 30th to celebrate Memorial Day. About sunset on the 29th, four fighters were launched for anti-submarine patrol. The plan was that after they were brought back aboard, operations would suspend until after the Memorial Day celebration. Alas, the best laid plans of mice and men and sailors aboard a carrier have often gone

astray. At a little after 8 PM, three torpedoes from the submarine that we had been hunting found us and within about an hour and a half the "Block Island" was on its way to the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean. Our Destroyer Escorts, however, were able to locate and sink the submarine. A fourth torpedo did hit one of the Destroyer Escorts and did considerable damage, but it did not sink and another Destroyer was able to tow it to Casablanca. We were very fortunate. Of the almost one thousand men on board, only six were killed by the torpedoes. Six planes were in the air and later we found that all but two were able to water land and the pilots were saved. So, you can see, the miracle of that Memorial Day was that most of us were still alive and only a very few had major injuries. We were aboard the Destroyers and headed for Casablanca. And although we were not able to celebrate in the manor that had been planned we were able to send telegrams to our families that we were safe and well.

A few days later, we found ourselves in Army fatigue clothes at Fillipie Stadium, North Africa celebrating "D" day. Back home, the sinking of the Carrier was released with the other D-day news, but the "Safe and Well" telegrams arrived a couple of days later. Now on Memorial Day, I have eight special people that I must remember. Of course, I need to say a prayer for all of those who have served OUR country. I just wanted to share this personal memory and hope that our remembrance of all of our veterans is a special time.


GREETINGS AGAIN GENTLEMEN.

AS WE RELAX AND ENJOY the lazy, hazy days of summer, let us pause for a moment to reflect on Rex R. Hutchins commentary in , "A Bridge to Light", as he poses the following question:

"Do evil and calamity exist to provide an opportunity for the practice of virtue?" This is exemplified through a narrative by David Ovason in his book, "Lost Symbols? The Secrets of Washington, D.C."

Mr. Ovason relates the story of Pierre (Peter) Charles L'Enfant. the son of a painter to the King of France. L'Enfant managed to obtain permission in 1777 to join the American forces fighting the British for their independence. Left for dead after the terrible British assault on Savannah, he managed to survive, only to be later captured by the British during the siege of Charleston in 1780. He was then held prisoner for two years. After his release, General Washington recommended him to a position of major with the Continental Army's engineers.

After the struggle for independence was over, Wasington became leader

of the new nation. As president in 1791, he commissioned L'Enfant to plan the streets and public buildings for a new federal city. Moving to location to begin, he met John Trumbull, artist of note for the period. While visiting Suter's Tavern in Georgetown, Mr. Trumbull found L'Enfant, Master Mason, hard at work on his famous plans for the city. This was not surprising, since Brother Suter's hotel, the Fountain Inn, was regularly used by the Masons of Georgetown as the meeting place for their Lodge. Thus, the cornerstones for the development of this new nation's capital, to be named after her first president, were laid. A man instrumental in this endeavor, Pierre (Peter) Charles L'Enfant, survived evil and calamity to help create this city of light reflecting northward from the banks of the Potomac.

There are many opportunities to join in and help. This next class will be an extra challenge as we partner with the York Rite to put on the Degree's as many of us belong to both.







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"THE TEMPLE IS DISTRESSED"

IF YOU STAND ON THE EAST SIDE of the 3800 block of North Charles Street in Baltimore City and look across the street, you will see a most unique structure. It is the Scottish Rite Temple. This imposing structure is so unique that it has been put on the registry of National Historic Landmarks. It is the home of the Baltimore Valley of Scottish Rite Masons and also houses the Hilgenberg Learning Center for children with speech and learning disabilities.

This imposing structure is the center for many Scottish Rite and Masonic activities and also is the home office of the Sovereign Grand Inspector General of Maryland Scottish Rite Masons. In the past it has been used for many Masonic and Eastern Star activities as well as being the center for community and charitable programs.

Over the eight decades of its existence, Mother Nature has not been very kind to this beautiful and unique structure. Wind and rain, ice and cold, and summer heat have taken its toll upon the exterior of this beautiful and proud structure. A series of recent inspections have revealed that the exterior of the Temple Building is in need of serious repairs to prevent further damage to the interior of the building.

In order to obtain the funds needed for the repairs to the Scottish Rite Temple, the Scottish Rite Holding Company has approved a special fund raising campaign to obtain the funds needed for the emergency repairs to the exterior of the building and the other repairs needed to preserve the Temple Building. If we are to be successful in this endeavor, we will need a 100% participation of all Scottish Rite Masons.

You will be receiving additional information about the fund raising campaign which will come to you, initially, through the mail. Special meetings and fund raising events will be held throughout the state to keep everyone informed as to the needs and progress of the campaign.

WHAT IS THE FEAST OF TISHRI?

Deut. 16:13—Thou shalt observe the feast of tabernacles after thou hast gathered in thy corn and wine.

The Feast of Tabernacles also commemorates the ceremonies of the completion and dedication of King Solomon's Temple, which began in the year 2992 A.L.*, and finished in a little more than seven years. Six months after its completion, in the month of Tishri—the seventh month of the Jewish calendar—the Temple was dedicated with reverential ceremonies to the one Living and True God. That these ceremonies would reach the highest religious significance, King Solomon postponed the dedication until the Feast of Tabernacles, the 15th day of Tishri, a day he well knew would bring every zealous Israelite to Jerusalem.

The Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States has proclaimed the Feast of Tabernacles as the Feast Day of the Lodge of Perfection.



A Word from Dr. Albert G. Mackey, 33°

OF THE NECESSARY PROBATION AND DUE PROFICIENCY OF CANDIDATES BEFORE ADVANCEMENT. There is, perhaps, no part of the jurisprudence of Masonry

jurisprudence of Masonry which is more necessary strictly to observe than that which relates to the advancement of candidates through the several degrees. The method which is adopted in passing Apprentices and raising Fellow Crafts—the probation which they are required to serve in each degree before advancing to a higher-and the instructions which they receive in their progress, often materially affect the estimation which is entertained of the institution by its initiates. The candidate who long remains at the porch of the temple, and lingers in the middle chamber, noting everything worthy of observation in his passage to the holy of holies, while he better understands the nature of the profession upon which he has entered, will have a more exalted opinion of its

beauties and excellencies than he who has advanced, with all the rapidity that dispensations can furnish, from the lowest to the highest grades of the Order. In the former case, the design, the symbolism, the history, and the moral and philosophical bearing of each degree will be indelibly impressed upon the mind, and the appositeness of what has gone before to what is to succeed will be readily appreciated; but, in the latter, the lessons of one hour will be obliterated by those of the succeeding one; that which has been learned in one degree, will be forgotten in the next; and when all is completed, and the last instructions have been imparted, the dissatisfied neophyte will find his mind, in all that relates to Masonry, in a state of chaotic confusion. Like Cassio, he will remember "a mass of things, but nothing distinctly."

A hundred years ago, it was said that "Masonry was a progressive science, and not to be attained in any degree of perfection, but by time, patience, and a considerable degree of application and industry." And it is because that due proportion of time, patience and application has not been observed, that we so often see Masons indifferent to the claims of the institution, and totally unable to discern its true character. The arcana of the craft, as Dr. Harris remarks, should be gradually imparted to its members, according to their improvement.

There is no regulation of our Order more frequently repeated in our constitutions, nor one which should be more rigidly observed, than that which requires of every candidate a "suitable proficiency" in one degree, before he is permitted to pass to another. But as this regulation is too often neglected, to the manifest injury of the whole Order, as well as of the particular lodge which violates it, by the introduction of ignorant and unskillful workmen into the temple, it may be worth the labor we shall spend upon the subject, to investigate some of the authorities which support us in the declaration, that no candidate should be promoted, until, by a due probation, he has made "suitable proficiency in the preceding degree."

SCOTTISH RITE MASONRY IN MARYLAND - PART II

Excerpt from: Gould's History of Freemasonry throughout the World



IN THE SUMMER OF 1860, the Rev. William D. Haley Thirty third Degree of Washington, District of Columbia, a member of the Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States and Deputy Inspector General for the State of Maryland, visited Baltimore and Communicated the Degrees of this Rite to nine Brethren. Those men then applied for and received letters of Constitution empowering them to form a Grand Consistory for the State of Maryland. Under this Charter, the Grand Consistory of Sublime Princes of the Royal Secret Thirty second Degree for the State of Maryland was organized. During the same month a Chapter of Rose Croix was also organized. Sovereign Grand Commander Pike, assisted by Bro. Albert G. Mackey, Bro. B. B. French, Bro. William D. Haley, Bro. A. T. Pearson, and others of the Southern jurisdiction, together with several Brethren of

the Northern Jurisdiction, Constituted and Installed the Officers of both the Grand Consistory and the Chapter of Rose Croix. Shortly after that, the War Between the States broke out, and in consequence no Labor of any kind was performed by either Body.

In June 1867, Bro. Thomas A. Cunningham was invested with the Thirty-third Degree, and Constituted as Active Inspector General for the State of Maryland. At about the same date, Bro. William S. Rockwell, of Georgia, Lieutenant Grand Commander of the Supreme Council, took up his residence in Baltimore. With the assistance of Bro. Cunningham, Bro. Rockwell Communicated the Degrees up to the Thirty second Degree upon fifteen members between the years 1867 and 1870. Together with the survivors of the old Consistory, these members then reorganized the Grand Consistory on January 6,

1870. Later that year, from May 2 to May 7, the Supreme Council held its Session in the Masonic Temple at Baltimore. Sovereign Grand Commander Pike and members of the Supreme Council from various parts of the jurisdiction were present at that meeting. During the Session, the Grand Consistory of Maryland was publicly constituted and the Officers were installed by the Grand Officers of the Supreme Council. Though Dispensations had been issued for the formation of three Lodges of Perfection, a Council of Princes of Jerusalem, a Chapter of Rose Croix, and a Council of Kadosh, only the two first named Bodies were organized.

On December 27, 1873, a Charter was granted for the formation of Mizpah Lodge of Perfection, No. 3. This Body was Constituted on January 28, 1874, by Grand Commander Richard H. Snowden. At once it started on a vigorous and prosperous existence. It is doubtful whether or not in the entire Southern jurisdiction there ever was a Body of the High Degrees that performed the Work more effectively than this Lodge. Bro. Ferdinand J. S. Gorgas was the T.P. Master from the time of the organization of the Lodge in 1874, to September 24, 1881. On that date the Charter was surrendered to the Grand Consistory.

Intendent of the Building

OUR SCOTTISH RITE is often referred to as the University of Freemasonry and I couldn't agree more. The degrees provide a professional school and instill lessons that can be applied by the class far after they leave the conferral and go back to their daily lives. Each of the degrees offer a set of tools or lessons that can be applied outside of the walls of the Temple. Our eighth degree, for example, is one that I often consider in my professional life.

The eighth degree, or Intendant of the Building, is centered in the management of the work after the murder of Hiram. King Solomon had a problem. He had a partially completed Temple but without a master to oversee the work, how could it be done? It is pointed out

in the discussions concerning the path forward that Master Hiram took great pleasure in teaching the builders secrets that he had learned in his travels to a small cohort of eager students. These students are the very means to complete the Temple. The degree shows the importance of education but also provides a framework for the candidate to consider as he serves as the exemplar of the degree. The word intendant is actually a title and refers to a publicly appointed office and not surprisingly it, like many of our degrees, has its origins in France where an intendant is a royally appointed civil servant. The very title of the degree connotes that the five eager students are appointed for a civil purpose and not elevated as an empty honor.

Benevolence and charity is the admonishment that the candidate is offered. While these five students were imparted with knowledge and have been appointed as chiefs and overseers, they are not to forget that while they are no longer performing operative work, they have to inspire the work of others. Work has its own dignity, and the work itself and its completion is what is important. The candidate is taught to offer good counsel and be as

eager to correct his own faults, to be not concerned with what others have and we do not. These are valuable lessons indeed.

The section of the degree I most enjoy is the love that Master Hiram had for imparting his knowledge on students who are interested in learning. From the instructors and Past Masters who teach the work in our Blue Lodge, to the degree teams of our Rite, we see this in action throughout the Fraternity. The degree teaches that human progress is achieved by one generation passing on the knowledge to each subsequent generation. This is the key to progress in society and the Fraternity. Just as Hiram passed his knowledge onto eager students, or those best suited to receive them we have an opportunity to mentor and pass along our knowledge to provide the next step in a career or to provide the encouragement for a Brother to expand his horizons. At its essence, the degree is a reminder of the unique opportunity we have as men, and Masons to pass on what we have learned while always remembering the dignity of work... and that noble emulation of who can best work and best agree. See you in the Classroom.

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The York/American Rite

Taken from the York Rite Freemasonry – Official Information Page

THE YORK RITE, or more correctly, the American Rite, is based on the early remnants of Craft Masonry that were practiced in the early 1700's. The formation of the first Grand Lodge of England in 1717 specified that the lodges were to confer only the degrees of Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft, and Master Mason, all other degrees being considered spurious. However, many lodges had been conferring other degrees that they considered an integral part of Masonry, in particular that of the Royal Arch, and formed their own Grand Lodge in 1751, terming themselves the "Antients" and the other Grand Lodge members the "Moderns." With the merger of the two Grand Lodges in 1813 into the United Grand Lodge of England, the lodges agreed that only the three accepted degrees of Masonry would be used by the lodges, but the degree of the Royal Arch would be attached to Chapters allied directly to these lodges and bearing the same number as the lodge, though as a separate body. Thus, unlike the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, which claims to hold the power of conferring the first three degrees of Masonry in addition to those under its jurisdiction, those found in the York Rite have rightfully acknowledged the fact that they are considered appendant to those of Ancient Craft Masonry. It is

still the practice in English Masonry that a Masonic member is not considered to be in possession of all the degrees of Ancient Craft Masonry until he has been exalted to the Royal Arch.

Early American Lodges operated in a similar manner until the establishment of the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons. For a period in US history, the Cryptic degrees were controlled by various state Grand Chapter jurisdictions, until the establishment of the General Grand Council. The Chivalric Orders have been controlled by the Grand Encampment since the early 19th century in the United States. All three bodies are technically autonomous Masonic entities, only the requirement of membership in the Royal Arch connecting the Cryptic degrees and Chivalric Orders together.

Appendant to the York Rite Bodies are several additional Masonic bodies, most of which are invitational in nature. Membership in many of them is predicated on membership in the Royal Arch, though some have memberships predicated on other bodies of the York Rite, or membership in all of the York Rite bodies. Many are found in other jurisdictions outside of the United States, but several are uniquely American in their origin.
