THE STOIC FREEMASON: THE FOUR VIRTUES

As Entered Apprentices, we learn of the Four Cardinal Virtues: Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence, and Justice. These four virtues go back to the very beginnings of the Greek Stoics' writings: Temperance, Courage, Wisdom, and Justice (or moderation, courage, wisdom, and morality, pick your poison - do not insert Socrates joke here.) The Stoics believed that a life well-lived was one which always countered adversity with virtue. These four nearly universal virtues have been adopted by Christianity and most of Western philosophy. The author C. S. Lewis points out they are called "cardinal," not because they come down from church authorities, but because they originate from the Latin cardo, or "hinge" and interconnect with one another. For Stoics.

the word virtue (excellence) is "aretê", the highest state of quality something can reach. Using arete as a compass, the Stoic lived life focused on the quality of every action and experience.

For the Stoics:

Temperance (sôphrosunê) meant self-control more than moderation - control of our impulses and our ability to make correct choices. Self-discipline (eutaxia) and propriety (kosmistês) should be the rule and guide of combatting the desires and pleasures that cause conflict to our conscience. Temperance should create harmony and equilibrium within ourselves.

Fortitude (andreia) extended beyond courage and included the ability to endure discomfort. Temperance, when combined with Fortitude, allows one to master one's passions, desires, and fears. Here we find Epictetus' famous maxim, "endure and renounce" – stand firm in the face of danger and leverage wisdom to buttress one's resolve and determination (aparallaxia).

Prudence (phronêsis) was perhaps the most important of the Stoic virtues because it allows us to sense what is good, bad, and indifferent in life. For the Stoic, it meant to grasp things rationally and see things as they are.

Prudence, therefore, is closely related to philosophy (love of wisdom) and is the antithesis of ignorance.

Justice (dikaiosunê) considered beyond the legal sense of what would be moral in our dealings with others. It translates more broadly as "righteousness", or simply, social virtue or morality and bounds us to unjust or do wrong by another person morally. It identifies the greatest good in man.

We are given much classical knowledge and wisdom in our First Degree of Freemasonry and a sampling of how to make distinctions between the two. (Remember, knowledge is knowing a tomato is a fruit. Wisdom is knowing to not put a tomato in a fruit salad.) So why are these four Stoic virtues emphasized in our First Degree lecture? The most probable reason is that they lend a basic explanation of the ancient philosophical doctrines on ethics. These four virtues work harmoniously in our lodges, they complement each other and add perspective on how we can approach living a virtuous life. For the new Entered Apprentice, the Four Virtues reinforce his expected behavior as a Freemason and give him some very useful tools as he begins his Masonic journey.

It is neither the Feast of the Passover nor a Sacrament of Holy Communion, although it commemorates the spirit of both days."

What we can take from this is our ability to cast differences aside, come together as one and rejoice. I believe that this is the type of unity the world needs today now more than ever, and I strongly encourage you to join us in this year's Maundy Thursday with any friends and family that may be interested.

May the Blessings of Heaven rest upon each of us and may God continue to keep all Scottish Rite Mason's and their family under the safety of his arms.

8:00am - Opening Ceremonies

4th degree – Secret Master: Your first steps into our sanctuary are duty, reflection and study. They teach us to honor those relationships to God, family, country, Masonry. The apron is white and black, with a letter "Z" and all-seeing eye. The jewel is an ivory key with the letter "Z" on the wards. The lessons of the 4° are secrecy, obedience, and fidelity.

14th degree - Perfect Elu (Grand Elect, Perfect and Sublime Mason): In this degree, we learn to reflect and look into ourselves. We should strive to be true to ourselves and our God. The apron is white silk, bordered in gold, with the Ineffable Delta in the Center. The jewel is a quadrant (compass open to ninety degrees) topped by a crown, and with a nine-pointed star on the obverse, and a five-pointed blazing star (with the Tetragrammaton) on the reverse. The compass is opened on a segment of a circle, inscribed with the numbers 3, 5, 7, 9.

18th degree - Knight Rose Croix: This degree teaches that life and its strengths come from God. The rose signifies the dawn and the cross is a sacred symbol of antiquity in many cultures...to be tolerant of others' errors and faults. The apron is of white leather or satin, bordered in red, with a skull and cross-bones, a red passion cross, and three red rosettes. The grand jewel is a gold

compass open on a quarter circle. A rosecross is between the legs of the compass, and under it is a pelican, tearing its breast to feed its seven young, on the obverse, and an eagle with wings extended, on the reverse. On the circle are the letters I.N.R.I.

30th degree – Knight of Kadosh, or Knight of the White and Black Eagle: The lesson of this degree is to be true to ourselves, to stand for what is right and just in our lives today. To believe in God, country and ourselves. There is no apron, but the jewel is a gold Teutonic cross, enameled in red, with the letters J.'.B.'.M.'. on the obverse, and a skull transpierced by a poniard on the reverse.

32nd degree - Master of the Royal Secret:

The lessons of this degree are that "genuine brotherhood requires mutual regard, opinion, esteem and charity". We always look for the good in all, make allowances for others' short comings. We trust the Supreme Architect to lead us to friendship, morality and brotherly love. The apron is white, lined in black, with a double-headed eagle and a plan of the Camp of the Princes. The jewel is a golden Teutonic cross, with a double-headed white and black eagle in the center.

I participated in the first section of the Master Craftsman program and learned a lot about masonry and could see right away why they call it the Masonic University.

We all receive our share of magazines, some monthly, others quarterly etc. These publications also provide an education in Masonry. There is usually a wide variety of topics and content to draw the interest of most.

The winter edition of The Scottish Rite Journal contained a message from The Grand Commander James D. Cole, 33° titled DOUGHNUTS. He referred to doughnuts as "a wonderful part of creation" and pointed out that even the most common varieties were soft and sweet on the inside. His favorite: however, were those with filled with crème, chocolate, or berry flavors. He says, "Perhaps a Masonic view of the doughnut world might suggest that like humans, while even the common glazed variety has something to offer that is delicious, the doughnuts with special filling (like a Mason) offer an added surprise." ALL SCOTTISH RITE MASONS are encouraged to attend and the portrayal is open to friends and family of all Scottish Rite Masons.

In the Scottish Rite, darkness often refers to the disappearance of truth and justice in the world. As the symbolic lights are extinguished, we reflect upon this loss. By relighting them, we reinforce our belief that,

as Knights Rose Croix, it is our duty to throw off the mantle of sorrow and darkness and to emulate those historical figures who have brought truth and knowledge to mankind. This solemn Ceremonial is an important part of the ritualistic work of the Chapter Rose Croix and expresses our commitment to the living of a conscientious and enlightened life.



THE SYMBOLS OF THE MYSTIC BANQUET

- 1. The Matzo, or unleavened bread is also called bread of affliction. It is symbolic of the bread which the Hebrews made when they hastily left Egypt, because they did not have enough time to allow their dough to rise. The Matzo is the most important symbol of the Passover.
- 2. The Moror, or bitter herb (represented by a small slice of Horseradish) is symbolic of the hardships which the Israelites endured while they were slaves in Egypt.
- **3.** The Haroses, a paste of apples, nuts, spices and wine is symbolic of the mortar the Israelites used, when they were slaves, in the construction of the Pharaoh's treasure cities, Pithom and Ramses.
- **4.** The Shank Bone, a roasted bone is symbolic of the Paschal Lamb that was sacrificed and eaten on the eve of Passover.
- **5.** The Hard Boiled Egg, , is symbolic of life and the springtime when nature renews life.
- **6.** The Four Cups of Wine commemorate the four promises made by God to Moses to redeem the Israelites and bring them out of bondage.

Brief History of the Scottish Rite in Puerto Rico

Scottish Rite from the South Jurisdiction of the United States were founded on Charleston, South Carolina on May 31st, 1801. After it was founded on South Carolina, The Supreme Council of Charleston constituted in Cuba the Supreme Council of Colon, which was recognized as the only authority in Cuba and West Indian Island to include Puerto Rico in our political status back then.

Under the Jurisdiction of the Supreme Council of Colon in Cuba, which existed in Puerto Rico, various Scottish Rite bodies like Caparra and Regeneration of San Juan and others on different cities on the island. His deputy was brother Jose Ramos de Amaya 33° and between the principal members was Cayetano Coll y Toste. At the end of the year 1904 some bodies they shot down columns.

On the occasion of the cession of Puerto Rico to United States by the treaty of Paris in 1898, the Southern Jurisdiction and the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States were the only two powers of the Scottish Rite in which Puerto Rico where a looking which Jurisdiction will fall under, since the Island was now a territory of the United States.

In December 1901, the Grand Commander Richardson gave orders for Puerto Rico to fall under the Jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Inspector General George Fleming Moore Ill, 33° from the state of Alabama.

The Grand Commander Richardson instructed that the Illustrious Gorge Moore move to Havana to lecture with representatives of the Supreme Council of Cuba achieving with help of Brother Federico Degetau, Resident Commissioner of Puerto Rico in Washington, then that on September 23, 1904 he will forever renounce all the rights up to that time to maintain and establish bodies of Scottish Rite in Puerto Rico and transfer all to the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States.

In conclusion it is on the date of October 19, 1911 that the perpetual letter is received and it is that Puerto Rico was constituted as Orient under the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States.

In 110 years after it was constituted, the higher Bodies of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Orient of Puerto Rico, is known today, have been elected as a deputy the following Brothers:

Puerto Rico consisted of seven Valleys and, on 2017, The Supreme Council of Washington D.C. elected Illustrious Jose R. Lopez, 33° GC as Puerto Rico first Sovereign Grand Inspector General.

Johann Wolfgang von Goethe

August 28th, 1749 - March 22nd, 1832

OHANN WOLFGANG GOETHE is one of the literary greats of J the 18th century. A man of letters and poetic spirit, Goethe is famous for writing Faust, and other soul-searching works examining human nature. His glorification and dramatization of the struggles of man falls in line with the Masonic emphasis of humanism, of understanding and perfecting humanity. Initially wary of Freemasonry because he thought it would strip him of his independence, he came to embrace the craft on realizing the good work he could do within its framework.

Born in 1749 in Frankfurt Germany, Goethe distinguished himself with his literary genius by 25, when he published the first of his famous novels and was made a noble by the Duke of Saxony as a consequence. He found a welcoming home for his talents at the Duke's court, and it was there he began to seek out Freemasonry. The lodge he joined, Amalia, had a very on and off career, going dark once for 26 years. However, he stuck with the craft through every upturn and downturn, giving his all, evidencing high character, which is encouraged and sought by Freemasonry.

A renaissance man in the enlightenment, Goethe served as a military advisor to the Duke of Saxony during the wars of

Napoleon and carried himself nobly. He was also an economic advisor and a general friend to the Duke, who also joined the craft shortly after Goethe did. Throughout his life he put forth every effort to exemplify the principles in which he believed. It is said his last words were "More Light!" the Masonic significance of which is profound.

All sorts of things occur to help one that would never otherwise have occurred A whole stream of events issues from the decision, raising to one's favor all manner of unforeseen incidents and meetings and material assistance which no one could have dreamed would come her way. 

The Legacy of the 27th

Y BROTHERS how does Masonry bring together men of all backgrounds and cultures? In our Blue Lodges we bring men together, but it is in our Scottish Rite of Masonry that the framers of our ritual began to study how this feat was achieved. Consider my Brothers the example set forth in the entered apprentice degree. In our first degree of Masonry when the Master reminds us that in every clime are Masons to be found. So many Brothers all with their own traditions coming together through Freemasonry, how is this peaceful assemblage facilitated?

We Scottish Rite Masons use myth and allegory to express serious truths that is the gateway to understanding, and internalizing the lessons of the degrees. It is the degrees that bring the Brothers together, but how do they appeal to so many? In the twentieth century psychologists and anthropologists have

examined the power of myth and symbolism at length. Many of us may have read Jung or watched Joseph Cabell where he describes archetypes and elemental ideas. These two thinkers sought to show that the stories and experience of mankind are universal and speak to us across time and culture.

How does Masonry bring together men of all backgrounds and cultures?

Symbols and the common roles occurring through our stories speak to us because they reflect us. This mirrors the use of symbol in our system of degrees, the use of symbol can speak to each of us. There is a school of anthropology called structural anthropology that seeks to seek to show the evolution of cultural practices, how they arise out of needs either material or psychological. These were universal because each of person has the same basic needs, and asks the same questions: Where do we come from? Why are we here? Academics have spent lifetimes examining these issues, because if we understand where we came from we can understand where we are going.

of Freemasonry the first Scottish Rite Degree that attracts our attention is the Knight of the Sun, or Prince Adept. In this case the designers of our rituals sought to use the universality of symbols as the conduit that spoke to men of so many backgrounds. In Morals and Dogma Pike used the 26th degree to describe the universality of the sun, its importance, and its incorporation in religious traditions across the globe. In the 19th century Scottish Rite Masons like Pike were looking at traditions as glue that bound the Brethren together. In the ceremonies of the degree Brother Truth explains that everything in the degree, "even to the names and titles of the officers, is symbolical. These symbols do not explain themselves and it will depend on yourself whether what we have said and shall say to you shall be an explanation of them or only additional enigmas." The Scottish Rite in general and the 27th degree in particular pulls from traditions from across the globe. Like the Anthropologist or psychologist the Scottish Rite Mason studies the symbol as much to understand the world as to understand himself. My Brothers visit the Rite, visit your Blue Lodge, and I hope to see you in the classroom.
