WHAT IS THE FEAST OF TISHRI?

Deut. 16:13 - Thou shalt observe the feast of tabernacles after thou hast gathered in thy corn and wine.

The Feast of Tabernacles also commemorates the ceremonies of the completion and dedication of King Solomon's Temple, which was begun in the year 2992 *A.L., and finished in a little more than seven years. In the year 3001 *A.L., six months after its completion, in the month of Tishri, the seventh month of the Jewish sacred year, the Temple was dedicated with reverential ceremonies to the one Living and True God. That these ceremonies would reach the highest religious significance, King Solomon postponed the dedication until the Feast of Tabernacles, the 15th day of Tishri, a day he well knew would bring every zealous

Israelite to Jerusalem.

The Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States has proclaimed the Feast of Tabernacles as the Feast Day of the Lodge of Perfection, the 15th day of Tishri, (October).

As did the Israelites of old and the New England Pilgrims, Scottish Rite Freemasons gather to acknowledge the mercies which God has poured upon them with lavish hand. It is a time of rejoicing, yet a time to pay humble adoration to the Great Architect of the Universe, without whose aid there would be no harvest.

*Anno Lucius - Freemasonry adds 4,000 years to our current calendar year (example: 2011 becomes 6011 A.L.).

After the Ceremony, a "sit down" dinner will be served in the Banquet Hall & each attendee will receive a bag of fresh fruit.



build speech and reading skills."






Grand Commander's Fellows' Conference

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Eyes to See and Ears to Hear—The See of Charleston

YBROTHERS, as we resume labor at the Scottish Rite, we have an opportunity to see our Craft through a fresh set of eyes. Each meeting and degree conferral, you will hear the 'See of Charleston' referenced. But what exactly is the See of Charleston, and why does it matter to us as Scottish Rite Masons?

In the rich tapestry of Masonic history, the founding of the Scottish Rite stands as a cornerstone—a moment shaped by the vision and commitment of a few Brothers who sought to deepen and enrich the Masonic experience. On May 31, 1801, in Charleston, South Carolina, eleven dedicated men, led by John Mitchell and Frederick Dalcho, gathered to establish what would become the Supreme Council, 33°, Southern Jurisdiction. This was not merely the birth of an organization; it marked the dawn of a new era in Freemasonry, one that would extend its reach far beyond the confines of the Blue Lodge.

These Brothers, whose names now echo through the halls of our tradition, were not simply participants in a historical moment; they were architects of a future that would expand the boundaries of our Craft. Charleston, more than just a meeting place, became the cradle for a new Masonic body—a beacon that would light the way for countless Masons in their quest for knowledge and spiritual growth. But why Charleston? What did this city possess that warranted such a monumental decision?

Charleston was a city alive with culture and commerce, a place where old-world traditions met new-world ideals. It was here, amid this fertile ground, that the early Masonic degrees found a foothold and began to flourish. The city's unique blend of intellectual fervor, spiritual exploration, and vibrant fellowship made it the perfect setting for what would become the "Mother Council of the World."

Choosing Charleston as the seat of the Supreme Council was not merely a matter of convenience. It was a deliberate decision, recognizing the city's symbolic and practical importance. As a bustling port and crossroads of ideas, Charleston was ideally positioned to nurture the growth of the Scottish Rite. Here, new philosophies could be exchanged and adopted, laying a foundation upon

which the Rite could expand across continents.

In Masonic terms, the "See" refers to a seat of authority, a central location from which leadership exercises its jurisdiction—a headquarters of sorts but also a spiritual home. Thus, when we speak of the "See of Charleston," we are referring to the birthplace of the Scottish Rite's Southern Jurisdiction, the spot where our Supreme Council was first constituted. It represents more than just a geographic location; it is a touchstone, a reminder of our origins and the values that the founding Brothers hoped to impart—a commitment to the pursuit of knowledge, enlightenment, and brotherhood.

Even after the Supreme Council moved its administrative head-quarters to Washington, D.C., Charleston remained our symbolic "See." It was in this city that the principles of Freemasonry were expanded, deepened, and organized into the 33-degree system that we recognize today. Charleston continues to be a source of continuity and connection, anchoring the Scottish Rite to its founding principles while encouraging us, its modern stewards, to continue the work

Still Waters Run Deep

COTTISH RITE MASONRY is an excellent example of the sheer volume of information made available to each of us, most of which is directly practicable if we have the ears to hear. Exploring the multitude of topics can and will provide opportunities for study for the rest of this lifetime, and sometimes one may find himself wondering where to explore next. What is the most meaningful? What is the most applicable in daily life? Does this phrase mean what I think it means? Certainly, there is no single correct answer that fits each of us, yet always remember my Brothers: "seek and ye shall find". Luckily for us, we don't need to search for too long as the very first degree of this Rite yields great returns.

Stillness. Calmness. Silence. Tranquility. These qualities were so important to the ancients that they were personified as Houxia (Hesychia). She was the daughter of Δ ik η (Dike), the

Greek goddess of Justice. The discovery of the Prisse Papyrus, written circa 2100 AL, revealed that the skillful use of silence was extolled by a vizier known as Kagemni; the weight of this wisdom coming from the direct subordinate to the Pharaoh should not be taken lightly. This papyrus is considered – but not proven – to originate in the Old Kingdom circa 1700 AL.

It is interesting to see the concepts expressed by the ancients articulated in our degree work, with profound wisdom of ages long past presented right up front in the initial lessons. Are we not encouraged to keep emotions in check from the very beginning of our Masonic career? Travel back to the moment you began this appendant journey and recall what you were exposed to in the first Scottish Rite degree. In what posture were the candidate's hands placed? What, then, was placed in his hand? Consider the tranquil gravity of the Fourth degree, why this serves as the foundation for the remainder of your journey and why this lesson serves to prepare you for service to Brethren and to the community at large.

Masters of the Royal Secret have climbed a mountain of philosophy, yet it serves us to always have one foot at basecamp. To always remember that silence has a profoundly positive effect on prudence and temperance, it bolsters fortitude, and it allows justice to speak more clearly. Each of us have valid reasons why different degrees speak to us and which lesson most helps us to polish another rough corner off our ashlar. If you haven't seen the Fourth degree in a while, come and see the excellent degree work conducted in our Valleys. Maybe, just maybe, your ears may hear something that you need to hear at this point in your life.


As a younger 32° Mason,
